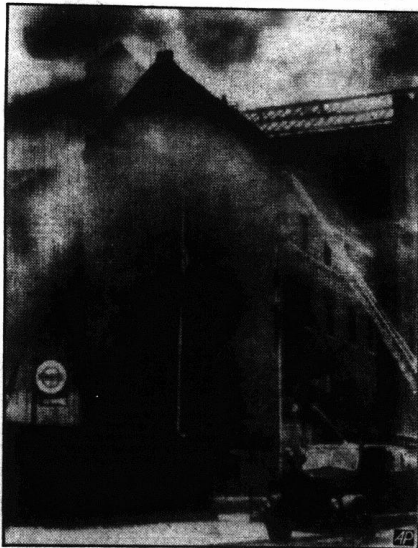


NAZIS ASSESS JEWS \$400,000,000 FINE IN SLAYING OF OFFICIAL

NAZIS LOOSE WRATH ON JEWS



FOLLOWING THE ASSASSINATION of a Nazi embassy attache in Paris by a Jewish refugee, Jewish synagogues and business houses were burned, dynamited or otherwise damaged in a dozen German cities. DUKE AND WALLY MAY SET UP HOME IN ENGLAND SOON

Public Reaction To Visit On Christmas Will Guide Future Actions

PARIS—(AP)—The possibility that the Duke and Duchess of Windsor might establish a home in England soon after Jan. 1 was forecast by the couple's friends Saturday as the ultimate result of their friendly meeting with the Duke and Duchess of Gloucester.

As the royal brothers' reconciliation talks came to an end, it was said the former King Edward VIII and his second younger brother had discussed Windsor's permanent return to England with his American-born duchess. The date was expected to depend on public reaction to their projected Christmas Day visit with the royal family in London.

The plan, said by friends to have been proposed by the British prime minister, Neville Chamberlain, would, however, bind Windsor to exclude the duchess, the former Wallis Warfield, from his official duties as member of the royal family.

They would remain away from London during the social season, it was reported, lest the duchess' participation in various functions raise knotty questions of precedence and rank.

Windsor, returning to the homeland he left after his abdication Dec. 10, 1936, would assume some of the royal family's duties from his busy brothers.

The Duke and Duchess of Gloucester left Le Bourget by royal airplane after the Duke and Duchess of Windsor went to the field to see them off.

In London the Duke of Gloucester was expected to report to King George on his talks with their elder brother.

The Gloucesters are returning from a visit to East Africa. They arrived from Marseille Friday and took a suite below that of the Windsors in the Maurice Hotel. A spokesman said the brothers greeted each other with "extreme warmth and affection" and the duchesses

SMITH AND DEWEY SCORE NAZIS FOR JEWISH TERROR

Reich Consulates At Boston And New York Threatened In Anonymous Notes

NEW YORK—(AP)—The new out-break of anti-Semitism in Germany brought strong protests Saturday from former Gov. Alfred E. Smith and Diet. Atty. Thomas E. Dewey, and anonymous threats of bombings to German consulates here and at Boston.

Dewey and Smith appeared together on a radio broadcast Friday night sponsored by the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League.

Declaring he wanted to "appeal to world opinion to rebuke a dictatorship gone mad," Dewey said:

"We stand appalled by the sight of what has happened in Nazi Germany. Dewey criticized the violence as an organized plot to crush the Jewish people, and a d d d. No amount of lame explanation by the German minister of propaganda can make the picture any different."

Smith said the German people had proved themselves incapable of living under a democratic form of government.

"Hitler's challenge is not alone to the Jewish people but to the Catholics, the Protestants and everyone else, and it strikes at the very foundation on which we have erected America."

CATHOLIC CARDINAL'S PALACE IS STORMED

Violent Persecution Wave Arouses British Leaders To Bitter Protest

Germany's remaining 500,000 Jews were uprooted from German economic life and fined 1,000,000,000 marks—\$400,000,000—Saturday for the murder of Ernst vom Rath, German diplomat in Paris, by a Jewish youth.

How the 1,000,000,000 marks will be raised was not disclosed.

The fine was assessed in a decree issued by Field Marshal Hermann Wilhelm Goering after a conference of ministers.

ASSASSIN VICTIM'S RITES

PARIS—(AP)—French Foreign Minister Georges Bonnet and high German government officials Saturday attended funeral services for Ernst vom Rath, secretary of the German embassy here, who was killed by a Jewish youth.

Baron Ernst Von Weizaecker, German secretary of state, headed an official group which arrived from Berlin to represent Reichsfuehrer Hitler.

After the ceremony the coffin was placed on a special train to be taken to Duesseldorf for burial.

Goebbels closed new Nazi barriers around Jews, isolating them further from the nation's cultural and economic life.

In Paris, French authorities arrested Abraham and Chana Grynspan, uncle and aunt of the 17-year-old assassin of the German legation secretary, on charges of complicity in the crime.

The couple had just been released after five days' detention on charges of harboring an undesirable foreigner. Under French law they could not longer be held on those charges.

At the same time, arrests and isolations of Jews were reported in Berlin, Salzburg and Frankfurt on Main.

Semi-official sources disclosed 1,600 Jews had been arrested in Berlin alone in the anti-Semitic campaign resulting from the slaying.

In Britain the voice of Mrs. Walter Elliot, wife of the British minister of health, was added to the chorus of denunciation of Germany's treatment of Jews. She said "We must be back in the Middle Ages."

The Independent Labor party in a letter to the German ambassador, described the actions as a "throwback to the jungle."

This reaction emphasized the difficulty Prime Minister Chamberlain may have in forwarding his appeasement policy as a result of the anti-Jewish wave in Germany.

As a by-product of their anti-Semitic fury, Nazis vented their wrath against Catholics in Munich, where they stoned the palace of Michael Cardinal Faulhaber. They broke many windows in the cardinal's residence after he had sought police protection.

The Nazi goal, apparently, was to push Germany's remaining Jews into a ghetto or small corner if not to force them entirely out of the country.

After conferring with other top Nazi leaders, Goering also decreed:

1. Prohibition for any Jew to conduct a business.

2. Elimination of Jews as top executives in any industrial concern.

More measures "for solving the Jewish problem" were to come.

Jews, it was also decided, must pay for all damage to Jewish property "occasioned by the indignation of the people over incitement by international Jewry against National Socialist Germany."

A spokesman for the consulate said, however, that such threats had been frequent in recent months and there was "nothing to be alarmed over."

A guard also was placed over the German consulate in Boston. Acting Consul Kurt Bohme said he had received two warnings by telephone that the building would be blown up. Bohme said he was "not afraid" and the consulate would be "open as usual."

Carrie Chapman Catt, veteran pacifist and feminist leader, and the National Council of Women sent telegrams to the State Department asking the government to protest the persecution of Jews in Germany and Palestine.

Louis Bromfield, Pulitzer prize-winning novelist, suggested that the peninsula of Lower California (Mexican territory) be turned into a haven for refugee Jews. Capt. Victor A. Cazalet, member of the British parliament, proposed that a million Jews seek refuge in Northern Rhodesia, Africa.

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U. S. Consulate In Berlin Haven For Hunted Jews

BERLIN—(AP)—The American consulate was a pathetic sight Saturday as hundreds of Jews, many in tears, milled around begging for preferred treatment on their visa applications.

Many were women who, when questioned, said their husbands had been arrested in the anti-Jewish campaign of the past two days. Often they broke down in the midst of their story.

Consular officials said Thursday—the day the Nazis smashed windows and burned synagogues—was unusually quiet at the consulate because Jews then did not even venture into the streets. Friday the consulate was closed on account of Armistice Day, and Saturday the visa seekers came in throngs.

But there were not only visa seekers. Consular officials had a definite impression that many of those standing in line patiently hour after hour merely wanted to be under an extraterritorial roof to prevent arrest.

Somehow they appeared to feel sheltered, even though but for a few hours, under the protection of the American flag.

NAZI MOB, FIRED BY SPEECH, VENTS HATE ON CARDINAL

A decree ruled that insurance claims by German Jews would be confiscated in favor of the German state.

It ordered Jews to remove all debris of the destruction immediately and declared that damage done to homes must be repaired in the same manner as that done to commercial property.

Propaganda Minister Goebbels prohibited Jews from attending any theater, movie, concert or other public presentation in Germany.

In Salzburg, officials disclosed that 300 Jewish families had been deported to a concentration camp after being ordered to report to police. They said not one Jew was left in the Salzburg district.

After two days of anti-Semitic violence and terror throughout the nation, strongly anti-Jewish Julius Streicher, governor of Franconia, declared that "the day is coming for a showdown of the Jewish people."

Excited Munich crowds descended on Cardinal von Faulhaber's palace with bricks and stones after hearing an attack on Catholics Friday night by Adolf Wagner, Nazi district leader for Bavaria. Between 60 and 70 windows on the ground floor of the imposing three-story palace were shattered.

Only last Sunday the 69-year-old cardinal, the Archbishop of Munich, used a passage from a speech by Adolf Hitler to support a plea for "the God-given rights of personality." He recalled that Hitler had

said Germany's greatest assets were her creative personalities. The sermon was greeted by whistling by Nazi listeners.

When crowds Saturday descended upon the archbishop's palace with bricks and sticks and shattered glass on the first and second floors no word was forthcoming from the interior of the imposing palace.

In Paris, President Albert Lebrun appealed to the French nation to accept with "discipline and goodwill" the sacrifices that it will be called upon to make in order to rebuild her strength and preserve Democratic government.

The sacrifices will be outlined Saturday night when Finance Minister Paul Reynaud tells the people by radio of the reforms contained in 32 financial and economic decrees to be published in the official journal Sunday.

President Lebrun spoke at a luncheon by the government to war veterans at a big Paris amusement park. He said the time had come to recognize that dreams of international harmony under the leadership of the League of Nations were premature.

Daladier, also addressing the veterans, warned the people that the government will not only ask their cooperation but will demand it if necessary.

In Ankara, Turkey, a cabinet reshuffle which eliminated Tefik Rustu Aras, veteran foreign minister and admirer of Soviet Russia, was seen by some observers Saturday as the first step away from Moscow toward the Rome-Berlin axis.

In a week's fighting in Spain, Government and insurgent armies again reached deadlock. Government forces held their Ebro River salient in Lower Catalonia. Insurgent dispatches said Generalissimo Francisco Franco's troops had cut short the government's five-day advance on the Segre River front, 30 miles to the north.

Thousands of Chinese civilians fled from towns and villages along the upper Yangtze River as Japanese capped a week's drive with occupation of Yochow, 122 miles up the Yangtze from Hankow, in Central China.

In Bordeaux, France, police arrested Paul Schafer, 28-year-old German, Saturday and accused him of writing a threatening letter to the German consul in Bordeaux.

Schafer said his motive was to take revenge for "injustices" of which he was the victim.

Schafer was ordered to leave France several months ago and feared he would be sent back to Germany.
